## LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

### General Comments

**Attention to All:** In the latest issue of the Military Officer, there are four letters to the Chairmen of the Senate and House Armed Services Committee as well as letters to the Ranking Minority Members of the same committees which should be detached and mailed as soon as possible.

With the constant competition for the budget dollars, we simply cannot afford to be shortchanged in this matter. Not only are our active forces faced with doing "more with less", our healthcare benefits are coming under heavy attacks on an almost daily basis.

Remember, we fought for fourteen years to regain adequate healthcare benefits lost in 1986 when we came under Medicare so let's not lose it again – **mail those letters today if you have not already done so!**

### Federal Issues

#### **The FY 2008 Defense Authorization Provisions**

The FY 2008 Defense Authorization Provisions has finally been approved by both the Senate and the House. Significant provisions which we have been following closely are:

- **TRICARE** – Prohibitions fee increase for FY08 until 30 September 2008. **Heads up for future proposed changes.**
- **Survivor Benefit Plan (SBP) Annuity-** Provides a special survivor payment of up to \$50 to survivors denied full SBP due to receipt of DIC. However, covers only survivors of qualifying retirees and gray area reservists. Payment increased by \$10/yr (reaching \$100 in FY2014).
- **Paid-Up SBP Coverage-** Proposed provision dropped. Therefore, further action becomes a mute point since the current law becomes effective in eight months on 1 October 2008.

- **TRICARE Fee Increases**-TRICARE fee increases for 2008 have been staved off for this year but stay tuned for future debates. This is one of the reasons you should send the letter mentioned above.
- **Reserve/National Guard Retirement**- Reduce retirement age by 3 months for each 90 days on active duty after 9-11-01. Change from 90 to 130 the amount of points earnable in one year. However, this becomes effective after it is signed into law. **Not perfect, but it's a start.**
- **Guard/Reserve GI Bill (MGIB)** - Authorizes Guard and Reserve members to use their mobilization earned GI Bill benefits up to 10 years after leaving service. **Yea, winner!**
- **Combat Related Special Compensation (CRSC)** - Expands eligibility to all medically retired for combat disabilities before 20 years of service.
- **Concurrent Receipt for Disabled Retirees Deemed "Unemployable"**- Implements full concurrent receipt retroactive to Jan. 1, 2005. (vs current date of Oct. 1, 2009.) except precludes payments until 10/1/08, when members will be eligible for lump-sum payment.

**Medicare/TRICARE Doctors Payments.** This issue has not gone away –merely delayed until 1 July 2008. **BUM-MER! Heads up everyone!** Get your letters in.  
**Civilian Rx Plans Would Beat TRICARE's** (Article transcribed from MOAA's weekly online update 15 Feb 08) Raising military pharmacy copays by 100% to 400%, as recommended in the FY2009 Defense budget proposal would put military pharmacy benefits among the lower half of civilian plans, according to the HayGroup 2007 Benefits Prevalence Report. For generic drugs purchased in retail

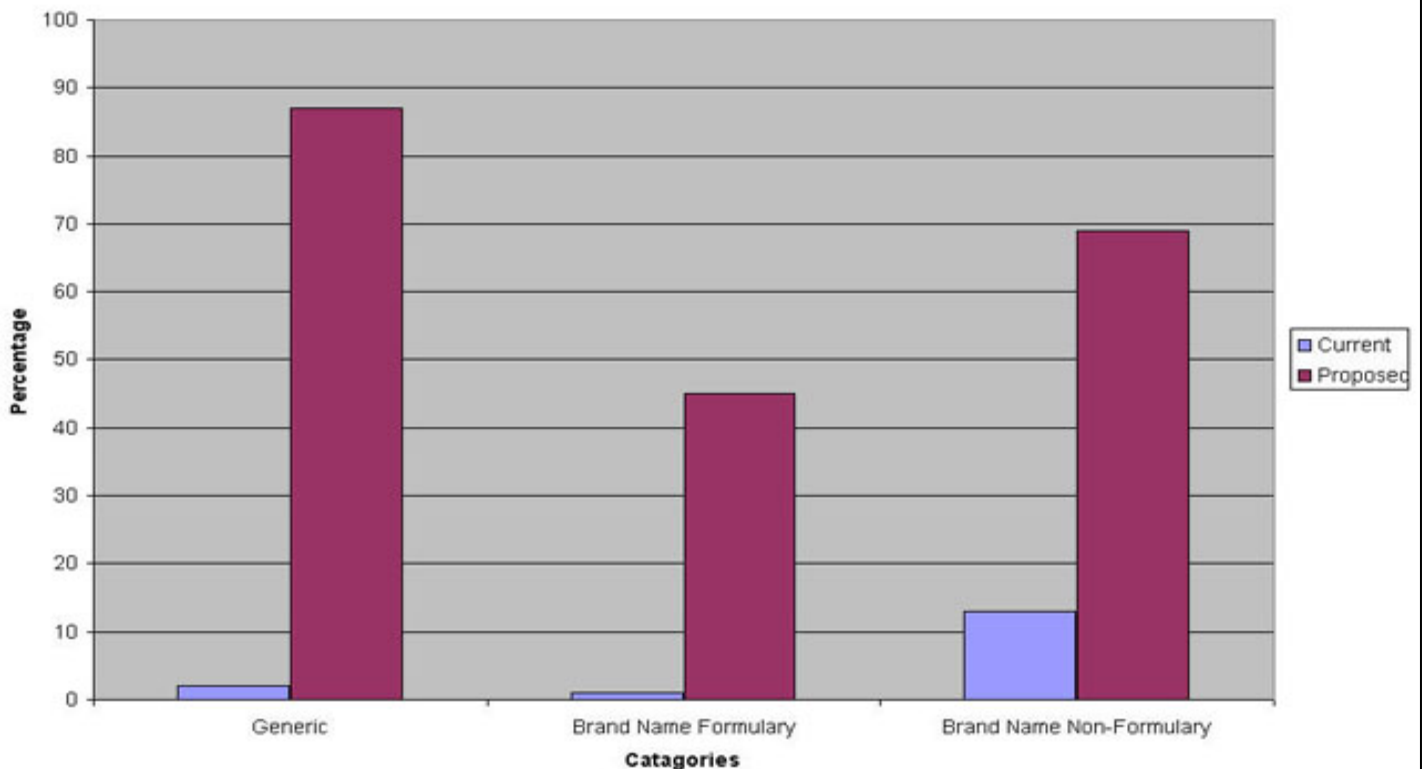
pharmacies, the defense budget proposes raising the beneficiary copay from \$3 to \$15. According to Hay Group, 83% of civilian employer plans charge less than that for generic drugs, with almost 20% charging \$5 or less. For brand-name drugs in retail stores, the Pentagon proposes raising the TRICARE copay from \$9 to \$25. The Hay Group survey indicates that almost half of civilian employers (45%) charge less than that.\$22 to \$45 -- more than 68% of civilian plans charge. This chart shows the percentage of civilian retail pharmacy plans that offer lower copays for medications. It distinguishes between the current copay structure and the DoD proposal for FY09.

In fact, many civilian plans are reducing or eliminating copays for generic drugs and medications used to treat chronic diseases like diabetes, because studies have found that higher copays actually deter many patients from taking medications that reduce the need for much higher-cost procedures later in life.

For one data point, MOAA's own employee plan (BlueCross BlueShield) offers our employees retail medications for copays of \$10 (generic), \$20 (brand) and \$35 (non-formulary brand) -- lower across the board than proposed for military beneficiaries. The TRICARE copays also would exceed those offered under many plans available to legislators and federal civilians.

Most telling of all, Wal-Mart offers over 360 medications at a copayment of only \$4 to anyone who walks in the door. Perhaps the purpose of the Pentagon-proposed fee hikes is to push more beneficiaries to use Wal-Mart rather than their TRICARE benefit.

That would certainly save the Defense Department money. But it wouldn't make military people feel very good about their military health coverage.

MOAA believes military beneficiaries' extraordinary service and sacrifice have earned them the best health coverage in America, and that it's an insult to propose shifting them to second-tier pharmacy coverage. (End of MOAA Article).

### State Issues

**State TRICARE Incentives.** . We have nothing new to report on this issue, but we are still working with CAL-MOAA to try to get State legislation, similar legislation to that in Oregon, to provide monetary incentives to health providers who accept TRICARE patients.

### Other Important Information

**DD-214's Online.** If you have lost your original copy of your DD-214, you can now get it from) the National Personnel Records Center (NPRC) at <http://vetrecs.archives.gov/>. This may be particularly helpful when a veteran needs a copy of his DD-214 for employment purposes. Military veterans and the next of kin of deceased former military members may now use a new online military personnel records system to request documents.

**Identity Theft Protection.** A Credit Report Security Freeze can block identity theft in most instances and is much more effective than a mere "Fraud Alert" because it's not fool-proof.

With a security freeze, businesses and lenders cannot access your credit information without your approval. This will have some obvious drawbacks because it will delay the lending process and will involve a payment of a fee to unblock your credit report. Also, this freeze will not affect your current accounts. Your existing accounts can still be accessed by those companies.

I recently had a case where my credit card company called me to find out if I had traveled to London recently as there was a \$580+ charge that had been submitted to pay to a private club in that city. All efforts to protect your credit are valid – 'nuff said.

**Tax Rebates.** The tax rebated will cover retiree and disabled. Those without taxable incomes at a reduced rebate level, as follows:

- People with taxable wages, investment income, or retirement income in 2007 will receive rebates of up to \$600 for individuals (\$1,200 for couples)
- Those with only nontaxable income of at least \$3,000 will receive \$300 (\$600 for couples)
- Anyone qualifying for a check will receive an additional \$300 for each dependent child under age 17

Full payments will go only to single people with less than \$75,000 in adjusted gross income (\$150,000 for couples). Rebates will be gradually reduced for those with higher incomes, and people making over \$87,000 (\$174,000 for couples) won't get any rebate.

## M.O.M.S RUN FOR FISHER HOUSE

Our local M.O.M.S. (Mothers of Military Servicemembers) organization has taken on another challenge. In addition to collecting, assembling, packing and mailing almost 35 tons of goodies, entertainment items, special clothing items, reading materials, essential toiletries, and who knows what else, to military personnel serving in Iraq and Afghanistan, the M.O.M.S. have now pledged to "Run For The Fisher House". Eighteen ladies, members of M.O.M.S., have entered THE HUMAN RACE, and pledged to raise \$25,000 for the Fisher House.

In case you haven't heard about the FISHER HOUSE, you are about to hear now. There are 26 Fisher Houses located on 16 military installations and at 4 VA medical centers in the U.S., and additional facilities overseas. The Fisher House program is a unique private-public partnership that supports America's military in their time of need. The program recognizes the special sacrifices of our men and women in uniform and the hardships of military service by meeting a humanitarian need beyond that normally provided by the Departments of Defense and Veterans Affairs.

Because members of the military and their families are stationed worldwide and must often travel great distances for specialized medical care, Fisher House Foundation donates "comfort homes," built on the grounds of major military and VA medical centers. These homes enable family members to be close to a loved one at the most stressful time - during the hospitalization for unexpected illness, disease, or combat related injuries.

There is at least one Fisher House at every major military medical center to assist families in need and to ensure that they are provided with the comforts of home in a supportive environment. Annually, the Fisher House program serves more than 10,000 families, and have made available nearly 2.5 million days of lodging to family members since the program originated in 1990. By law, there is no charge for any family to stay at a Fisher House operated by the Department of Veterans Affairs; and Fisher House Foundation uses donations to reimburse the individual Fisher Houses operated by the Army, Navy, and Air Force. No military family pays to stay at any Fisher House!

The Fisher House is a program which provides a facility (housing accommodations) for families of severely wounded veterans from the Gulf Wars.

These facilities, located on military reservations in close proximity to military hospitals, provide long term care to wounded veterans undergoing extended medical treatment, physical rehab and recovery treatment. Fisher Houses are located at Travis AFB, Palo Alto Veterans Hospital, others located in most large U.S. military installations throughout the world, including Walter Reed Medical Center; Fort Campbell, KY; Fort Bragg, N.C. The Fisher House provides living accommodations to soldier's families in order that families can be near their loved ones during extensive and prolonged treatment, therapy and recovery process.

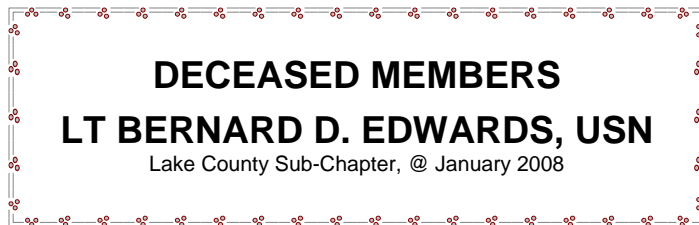
