DID YOUR NET RETIRED PAY DROP IN JANUARY?

Federal income tax withholdings increased slightly in January, yielding a net reduction in most members' military retired pay checks.

But the withholdings adjustment wasn't some new tax increase. It occurred because last year's economic stimulus package provided extra money in retirees' checks for the last eight months of 2009.

For 2009 and 2010, last year's Making Work Pay provision of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act authorized a refundable tax credit of up to \$400 for working individuals and up to \$800 for married taxpayers filing joint returns. The law was enacted in February 2009 and the IRS needed additional time to adjust tax withholding tables. Because of that delay, the \$400/\$800 tax reduction for calendar year 2009 had to be packed into the May-December paychecks rather than equally spread over the January-December checks.

In 2010, by contrast, the \$400/\$800 withholding reduction could be spread over the full 12 months of the year.

An example will illustrate. Reducing withholding by \$400 over 8 months of 2009 meant a single person's taxes went down \$50 a month for May thru Dec of 2009. In 2010, that same \$400 withholding reduction will be spread over 12 months...meaning their taxes are reduced by \$33.33 a month for 2010.

So between Dec 2009 and Jan 2010, they'll see their withholding increase (and take-home pay go down) by \$16.67.

So there was no new law or tax change. It's just that the two-year stimulus withholding initiative could not be implemented until the spring of 2009, so the tax withholding schedule had to be different for 2009 and 2010 in order to give people full \$400 tax credit each year.

If there had been a COLA for 2010, most people probably wouldn't have noticed this unusual withholding issue.

But the absence of any COLA made the change obvious – far more obvious than the explanation is!

SCARED STRAIGHT ON HEALTH CARE (CONTINUED)

Throw in a highly partisan political atmosphere in which Republicans and Democrats and liberals and conservatives endlessly trash each other's ideas and integrity, and everybody's blood pressure goes up — especially on such a vitally important topic as your family's health care.

Let's start with the real threats.

The most imminent one is the crazy formula in current law that requires compounded cuts every year in Medicare and TRICARE payments to doctors. For each of the past several years, Congress has imposed a one-year moratorium on the cuts, because they know allowing the cuts to happen would cause large numbers of doctors to stop seeing Medicare and military patients.

But Congress' failure to fix the basic statutory formula has meant the size of the annual cut has grown significantly every year.

Now, if Congress doesn't act before the end of February, current law will require a 21-percent payment cut as of March 1.

Now that's scary — scary enough that Congress almost certainly will stop it. But they'll probably just approve a fix for the rest of 2010. Which means they'll have to act again before the end of the year to stop a 26-percent cut for 2011. Really scary.

As for the next threat, we know it very intimately. Because that threat is us. Or rather me, and people like me. I'll be 63 years old in April and am among the leading edge of millions of baby boomers who will become eligible for Medicare in this decade.

And Medicare isn't ready for us. Under current law, Medicare will run out of money in about seven years. The Medicare trust fund actuary says the health care reform bill passed by the Senate would postpone that crisis for another decade — but only if you believe the optimistic assumptions the bill entails, about which the Medicare actuary is dubious.

That means Congress will have no choice but to make further Medicare changes soon — higher Medicare taxes, reduced benefits, or both. Very scary.

Meanwhile, the budget deficit and national debt are rising at unprecedented levels, which means just having the government borrow more money to fund growing health-benefit needs (like fixing Medicare and the doctor payment problem) is a non-starter.

So there will be tremendous pressure in coming years to cut government spending in virtually every area to free up more funds for those critical needs. And that means tremendous pressure on the defense budget, which means a renewal of all the threats we encountered during the tight budget years of the 1970s, '80s, and '90s: force cut-backs, pay-raise caps, COLA delays, higher health care fees, commissary threats, and more.

Unfortunately, those real threats often are obscured by new-age "red herrings" — the electronic equivalent of chain letters circulating on the Internet, Facebook, Twitter, etcetera, that assert some kind of outrageous proposal that we send to all our friends with a note asking, "Can this be true?"

Unfortunately, much of that well-circulated material turns out to be bits of old news that's no longer relevant, things that were originally written as satirical fiction, or blatantly false assertions that started as a joke or to serve someone's personal or partisan agenda. Nevertheless, it often acquires a life of its own on the Internet, evolving into ever-more-outrageous forms, as amused or well-intentioned people pass them on for months and years — and as the "Can this be true?" comments change to "This is true!"

Several such electronic chain letters assert there is imminent legislation that would require TRICARE For Life beneficiaries to pay thousands more a year for their coverage.

There actually was such an idea, floated by the CBO back in 2008, but it was never a serious proposal, nor was it supported by anyone in the administration or Congress. Nothing like it is contained in any legislation before the Hill. Are there legitimate reasons to be scared about our health care future? Yes.

That's why MOAA has several current legislative alerts asking members to urge their legislators to reverse impending Medicare/TRICARE payment cuts, protect military beneficiaries from adverse effects of health reform, and more.

But let's stay "scared straight" on our facts, and keep our energy focused on addressing real problems rather than fictional ones.

VA WILL WAIT TO RAISE DRUG COPAYMENTS

A \$1 increase in copayments for outpatient medications for veterans who do not qualify for free prescriptions is being delayed for six months while the Veterans Affairs Department reviews its options.

Copayments are required for a 30-day supply of medication provided on an outpatient basis to people being treated for disabilities or conditions that are not related to military service. Copayments are not charged for veterans who have service-connected disabilities rated at 50 percent or more, regardless of whether they are being treated for a service-connected issue, and copayments are waived for some low-income veterans.

The current charge of \$8 was supposed to rise to \$9 on Jan. 1 under regulations that call for prescription drug charges to keep pace with prescription drug charges in the private sector.

But on Dec. 31, VA officials announced in the *Federal Register* that they were delaying the increase until July 1 so they could reconsider how increases are calculated. This delays both the \$1 hike and a \$120 increase in the \$960 copayment cap on drug costs for veterans who have service-connected disabilities but are being treated for nonservice-related medical issues.

"We need time to determine whether an increase might pose a significant financial hardship for certain veterans and, if so, what alternative approach would be appropriate relief for these veterans," the statement says.

Created in 2002, the copayment cap began as a \$2 fee for a 30-day prescription but increased to \$7 in 2008 and to \$8 in 2009.

Under VA rules, the drug copayment is supposed to increase each Jan. 1 based on the increase in the prescription drug portion of the Medical Consumer Price Index, a measurement maintained by the Labor Department's Bureau of Labor Statistics.

The drug index, known as CPO-P, called for an automatic \$1 increase that can be delayed under current law but still has to take effect at some point.

VA officials called their action a "temporary freeze," with the expectation that the increase will take effect this summer unless a new way of calculating and applying the copayment is found.



SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATIONS

From The COL William G. Brey Scholarship Committee:

The application period for COL William G. Brey Scholarships opened on January 1, 2010, and will close on **March 15, 2010**. Closing date is firm. An additional reminder in the form of a one-page flier was mailed to each member of the Chapter in December.

We have already provided application packets to several prospective scholarship applicants.

Those eligible to apply for scholarship assistance are children, wards, and lineal descendants (including grandchildren, great-grandchildren, and great-great-grandchildren, natural or adopted) of living or deceased officer, warrant officer, or auxiliary members of the Chapter. Scholarship eligibility is limited to those pursuing undergraduate academic and professional certificate programs. Applications will not be accepted for support of graduate studies.

Our experience is that it can take several weeks for prospective applicants to gather all the required supporting documentation, then prepare and submit the completed applications before the cutoff date. We therefore recommend that Chapter members advise eligible family members of scholarship availability and contact information early enough to give them sufficient reaction time.
